Fantasy Fiction: stories with elements that are impossible

**Historical Fiction**: stories which take place during a specific time period from the past

**Horror Fiction:** stories with unknown or supernatural elements meant to scare you

**Humor Fiction**: stories with funny characters and events

**Mystery Fiction**: stories which include a problem that is solved at the end of the story

**Realistic Fiction**: stories which take place in modern time with events that could happen

**Science Fiction**: stories that explore possible events often in the future or on other planets

**Teen Fiction**: stories that focus on teenagers and the situations that help them transition to adulthood

- What does a preview of the text tell me?
- What do I already know?
- What do I think the text will say?

### **During Reading**

- Does the text make sense?
- What can I do to better understand the text?

- What questions do I have about the text?

### **After Reading**

- What did the text say?
- How can I connect the ideas to other texts and my knowledge?
- How can I use the information I have learned?
- Did I enjoy the text?
